President's Message



In the past month we have held two special services supported friends from Faith Connection, the local Interfaith organization of which we are a member. The first, followed the October 7 attack on Israel by Hamas. This resulted in killing the most Jews in one day since the Holocaust. Worship Co-Chair, Irv Joffee, and others discussed experiences they encountered in Israel over the years. We also discussed the effects here at home such as increased and overt anti-Semitism. Some of our Faith Connection friends spoke as well and we truly appreciate their

outpouring of support. I felt badly, however, that more of our congregation were not in attendance.

The second special service was led by Rabbi Shull a few weeks later. Each person was given a blue ribbon to wear to signify support for Israel and a swift, safe return to of the hostages captured by Hamas. In addition to the usual Shabbat liturgy, the rabbi explained why we recite certain prayers and their ongoing relevance. The March for Israel in Wash. D.C. on Nov. 14 was also promoted. Rabbi Shull and other members were among the reported 300,000 people that attended. Again, for this service, we were gratified to see a full house, and feel the support of the interfaith community and visitors, however, temple members were outnumbered by a ratio of more than 2 to 1.

It is a shame that more of our congregants don't attend in person. I understand why people stayed home during COVID when we all limited our activities. I wonder what it will take to increase attendance. Some people don't want to drive at night, but we have a grant that covers transportation for some (See p. 7). We also begin our lay-leader services at 7 p.m. now instead of at 7:30 so people don't get home as late. And during the rabbi's monthly visits, we offer a Saturday morning service/study/discussion session. Come join us.

Religious Education



Children's religious education at Temple B'nai Sholem continues full steam ahead. Our students are reading and writing Hebrew and enjoying short Hebrew conversations with their teacher and each other. They are learning to chant Shabbat prayers from the Siddur. They discuss the weekly Torah portion in depth, learn about Jewish history, and study the Jewish holidays and traditions.

Leah Ponder, a religious school student preparing to become a Bat Mitzvah in the fall, recited the blessings before and after the Torah during the Rabbi's November services and will join the Rabbi at the Bima to chant the V'ahavta and recite the Torah blessings in December. In addition, she is putting her artistic talent to work for her Bat Mitzvah community service project. She is working with her teacher to compile and illustrate *A Young Person's Guide to Bereshit and Shemot.* Religious school student, Evelyn Plaut, and her mother, Sarah Plaut, will help Leah edit and publish this wonderful gift of learning for future generations of Religious School students.

Pastoral Care



Committee's Support Programs. . . A very generous grant from the Carolina Foundation for Jewish Seniors (CFJS) allows us to continue to reach Jewish adults in the area who are isolated or experiencing serious life challenges. This year's grant (July 2023 - June 2024) provides

funding for professional one-on-one Temple support care, bi-weekly Shabbat Mitzvah Meals, training for the pastoral care team, and car service to and from religious services for Temple members who can't drive or arrange transportation on their own. With support from CFJS, people can receive case management services.

Dr. Stacy Lang, a licensed clinical social worker, who is also known to our Temple as Rabbi Ben Shull's spouse, conducted an informative training session for the Pastoral Care support team on November 11. We are very pleased to share that Dr. Lang will continue her work with our Committee's Support Program by providing much needed guidance and support.

Rachel Wolf, Executive Director of CFJS visited us to review our grant activities. She met with the Pastoral Committee Chair, representatives of the Temple Trustees, and longtime member, Bill Fiske. We passed with flying colors! Rachel was impressed with how much our small congregation has accomplished, and expressed sincere admiration for the work we are doing.

My Best Book by Marvin Cytron

Not too long ago, *The New York Times* asked readers to nominate their selection for best book. Not surprisingly, *To Kill a Mockingbird* by Harper Lee, (1960) was voted number one. Yes, a great book and a memorable film adaptation. I read it years ago and persuaded our teenagers to read this timely, important novel. Tragically, today we are witnessing many school districts outlawing this book for class discussion, along with books like *Huckleberry Finn*. Shades of Nazi Germany in the 1930's?

So, you might ask..."Marvin, what was your best book?" A book you probably never knew or read: *Boot Camp* by Ira Berkowitz (Jewish Publication Society, 1942). I still have that book, and as we have reduced our collection of books over the years, *Boot Camp* remains in a special place on our bookshelf and among my childhood memories.



A walk back to 1944 in St. Louis...I am nine years old, living over our father's store, Cytron Dry Goods. My brother, Ashley and I are the only Jewish kids in Bates Public School. Mom meets us after school with milk and cookies. We are then off to Hebrew school, by streetcar and bus, to the Jewish neighborhood, about thirty blocks away. Four afternoons a week plus Sunday mornings. As dad closes the store, he shares newspaper articles of the war, etc. as we listen to the Lone Ranger on radio KMOX. Dinner, homework and bed.

The weekend, ahh, special indeed. Friday afternoon to our beloved grandparents, Baba and Zada Salz, for Shabbat -- a grand dinner. Synagogue the next morning, then lunch. At precisely one o'clock Zada turns on the radio to listen to the Metropolitan Opera from NY with radio host Milton Cross. My first experience of opera and classical music, and to this day classical music fills our home every day.

For me...I joined other Jewish lads for baseball or afternoon matinees at the nearby movie theaters, some of which are still open, the Tivoli and the Pageant. But one cold, rainy afternoon, no baseball or movie opportunity. As I wandered around their little apartment, Zada said to me, "sit down, take a book and read!" I went to his big bookcase and alas every book was in Yiddish! As you may know, Yiddish is a Jewish language composed of Hebrew letters developed in Europe in the 1700's as a street language and print media, inasmuch as Hebrew was holy and limited for prayer books, the Bible, etc. I complained that I cannot read Yiddish. "Okay, next week a book in English for you." Zada was publisher and editor of *The Jewish Record*, one of the first Yiddish/English newspapers West of the Mississippi. He received many books to review for publishing.

The next Shabbat, yes, a book for me...Boot Camp. The story is about a Jewish lad who enlists in the Navy. He encounters anti-Semitism, but in the end he wins the boxing championship and becomes the hero of his unit. This was the beginning of my love of reading and books. For many years I wrote book reviews for several Jewish newspapers. So...what is your best book? And yes, I eventually learned some Yiddish! Zey Gezunt...Be blessed.
